L: Into the land of the Pohatan, Nottoway, and Shawnee peoples they came carrying little to nothing, but there they found streams that flowed clean, woodlands full of game, and deep dark soil for their plows to turn.

2. HEARING GOD'S WORD

Scripture: Deuteronomy 8:6-15

Deuteronomy 8:6 Therefore keep the commandments of the Lord your God by walking in those ways. **7** For the Lord your God is bringing you into a good land, a land with flowing streams, with springs and underground waters welling up in valleys and hills, **8** a land of wheat and barley, of vines and fig trees and pomegranates, a land of olive trees and honey, **9** a land where you may eat bread without scarcity, where you will lack nothing, a land whose stones are iron and from whose hills you may mine copper.

10 You shall eat your fill and bless the Lord your God for the good land that has been given to you.

11 Take care that you do not forget the Lord your God, by failing to keep all the commandments, ordinances, and statutes, which I am commanding you today.

12 When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them, **13** and when your herds and flocks have multiplied, and your silver and gold is multiplied, and all that you have is multiplied, **14** then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, **15** and who led you through the great and terrible wilderness.
